For the first time since the schools federated, the everyone came together for a fun afternoon of traditional scouting fun. This included activities such as tug of war, toast-



Astronomy Article June Edition

June has the most daylight of any month and the longest day and shortest night. Although the days get shorter after midsummers day on 21st June, the thermal lag means the hottest days are still ahead of us. It's a good time to look out for the rarely seen Noctilucent clouds: long whispy clouds with a distinctive electric blue tint which are clouds being lit by the Sun while it's below the horizon. These clouds are the highest of all clouds at around 80km and often hundreds or thousands of miles away from

the observer. The best time to look for them is towards the North, 90 mins to 2 hours after the sunset, close to the horizon

This month the Constellations are harder to pick out due to the lighter sky, but Cassiopeia will still be visible in the north east around 11pm. You will find it half way between the Pole star and the horizon as a distinctive zigzag of bright stars. In mythology Cassiopeia was a vain queen who was punished by Poseidon for her wicked ways and forced to wheel around the Pole star forever. Saturn will be visible just above the Moon if you get up early and look towards the South around 4am on 10th June. Jupiter will be very close to the left of the Moon at

a similar time on 14th and both Mars and Venus are just below the Moon in the evening of 22nd June around 10pm.

Topic of the Month: Invisible light Today we take for granted that visible light is just a

small part of the electromagnetic spectrum and that lots of other types of light exist which we can't see with our eyes, such as microwave, infrared, radio waves and x



rays. But years ago nothing was known about invisible light. The breakthrough came in the 1790's when William Herschel was splitting light using a prism. He was measuring the temperature of each colour and found that they indeed had different temperatures. Red and orange were warmer than other wavelengths. But his extraordinary discovery was when he put his thermometer in the darkness beyond the red end of the spectrum and found the temperature was the highest of all, even though his eyes were telling him nothing was there. This was infrared light but we now know the whole spectrum is huge. If the all the visible light we can see, from blue to red, was spread out on the floor like a rainbow of colours and was one metre long, just the infrared section of the spectrum would be three kilometres long! There are a vast variety of invisible light waves out there. Infrared is especially useful for astronomers because it can be used to detect objects which aren't visible to our eyes. It's strange thinking that in space where it's hundreds of degrees below freezing dust and other objects are emitting light for the same reason as a red hot iron bar. Everything is glowing and that gives astronomers a mechanism to detect and study the universe.
