With the coronation coming up, I thought I would have a look through S&SHA's archives to see if we had any photos or details of previous Coronation celebrations held in the village.

I found this photo of Angela Palmer being crowned Coronation Queen in 1953.

I also came across extracts from NWN dated 29th June 1911 - George V Coronation Celebrations, some as follows:

Lady Sutton who came back from London purposely to present the Coronation Mugs to the children and to take her share in helping to entertain the villagers.

On Coronation Day, Thursday 22nd June, there was a service in the Parish Church largely attended by the villagers. A new flag, St. George's, was hoisted on the church tower for the first time. Many houses in the village had been adorned with decorations, either flags, bunting or mottoes.

The national celebrations didn't take place until the Saturday and in Stockcross the festivities started with a programme of sports on the cricket field.

Starting with the 100 yards handicap race for girls 6-10 yrs, 10-16 yrs, both followed by boys races. Then the sack races and egg and spoon races.

Tug-of-War followed - 12 Stockcross Boys v 12 Marsh Benham Boys.

Then it was the turn of the Women, Tug-of-War (which I was quite surprised at, being 1911) followed by the Blindfolded Pony Race and the Egg and Spoon Race.

Time for the men: Tug-of-War, Throwing the Cricket Ball and Egg and Spoon Race where they were provided with a small tea spoon, which they had to carry in their mouths, and if they dropped the egg had to pick it up without removing the spoon out of their mouths.

After the fun of the Sports afternoon the children were presented with their mugs and afternoon tea was served at the School house.

In the evening the adults had a Meat Tea followed by a dance on the cricket pitch. The day's events finished with a bonfire and fireworks.

The National Anthem was sung many times, as were toasts to the new King .

The weather was very fine for the day and it seems a good time was had by all.

This being the mnemonic for remembering Linnaeus' classifications of species — Domain, Kingdom, Phylum etc. Steve Wallis' wonderfully dramatic words, often reminding me of Dylan Thomas, and Isabel Carmona's apt illustrations made for a magical and unusual afternoon and leaving us with something to dwell on.

At the end of March, Author Clive Williams delivered the tale of 'rags to riches' of the Craven family who lived at Benham Valence after making a fortune lending money and being Lord Mayor of London. We all agreed it was a wittily told story with many anecdotes. Clive's latest book, The Cravens, is available to buy at £30 per copy but we have 2 for sale at £20 each if anyone wants to buy a copy and it will be helping fund STOCC teas.

Many of you would have seen over Saturday 25 March 2023 a volunteer group from Sir Richard Sutton Limited (SRSL) working away at removing the tree guards from the 2012 Jubilee Wood plantation north of Stockcross. Rest assured; the remaining tree guards will be removed later this year. The stakes and guards taken away are all heading to a recycling centre, which turns wood and plastics into further useful products such as woodchip pellets and chicken houses.

We are now looking for more similar community-based clean-up projects within the village and surrounding area.

We need your help to put around 80 members of the SRSL Team to good use on 17 July 2023, and beyond, working on community-based initiatives in the area. Projects could include repainting parts of the inside of the village hall, decorating/treating play equipment on the recreation grounds, or litter picking along the roadsides around the village.

## **Astronomy Article May Edition**

This month the Eta Aquariids meteor shower peaks late in the evening of 6<sup>th</sup> May but will be displaying several days either side of that date. The Moon is fairly full around this date though, so we will only see the brightest ones. These meteors come from the trail of rubble and dust that came off the rocky surface of Halley's Comet when it last came close to the Sun.

The rubble and dust heat up in the atmosphere of Earth as Earth passes through the trail and show as bright steaks of light in the sky. Three planets are easy to spot this month. Saturn will be just above and to the right of the Moon early morning about 4.30am on 13<sup>th</sup> May, Venue will be just below the Moon around 10pm on 23<sup>rd</sup> and Mars just below the Moon on 24<sup>th</sup> around 10pm.

## **Topic of The Month**

Jupiter is the largest planet in our solar system with a mass two and a half times greater than the mass of all the other planets combined. It often shines brightly in



the sky and has been observed since ancient times. It has at least 95 moons though 79 of these are less than 10 km in diameter. The four largest moons were discovered by Galileo on January 7<sup>th</sup> 1610 and are all very different from each other and extremely interesting. Io is closest to the planet and is the most volcanic object in the solar system. Europa is completely different, smooth and white covered with frozen water ice 25 kilometres thick and it might have a liquid water sea underneath the surface which could harbour life. Ganymede is the largest moon and is bigger than the planet Mercury! It and the furthest large moon, Callisto seem ancient and are mostly heavily cratered but have smooth areas on their surfaces indicating some geological activity. All this makes Jupiter's moons a target that Astronomers want to investigate in more detail. Just last month the European Space Agency launched their instrument packed Jupiter Icy Moon Explorer (JUICE) to fly to Jupiter's moons and carry out flybys, collect data and finally go into orbit around Ganymede. However it's a long journey. Jupiter is 884 million kilometres from Earth and the JUICE probe won't reach it until 2031 so we have quite a while to wait before we have more information about these amazing objects.
