A TIME FOR REFLECTION

Who would have thought that the simple raising of a flag would cause so much consternation and division in our village? For those in the village who are not already aware, an unfortunate situation has developed concerning the flying of flags at the Sutton Hall.

I have been raising flags (all purchased at my own expense) at the Sutton Hall on behalf of the village for around fifteen years after taking over the role following on from Ivor Scull at the request of the Sutton Hall committee.

During this time we have raised the Union Flag in celebration of royal events, such as royal birthdays of the Queen and now the King, the sad death and funeral of our late Queen Elizabeth and the coronation of King Charles, also Trooping the Colour, and other royal occasions. The Union Flag has also been raised for VE Day and VJ Day (I supplied two Union Flags to decorate the Sutton Hall).

We have flown the St George's Cross to celebrate England's National Day, the Easter period, as well as various sporting events in support of England teams.

More recently, we have raised the Ukrainian flag in support of that poor country against the madness and evil of Putin.

Over all these years I have never had a single word of criticism or derogatory comment from anyone, and quite the opposite, there have been many times when people have commented how nice it is to see the flags flying, and thanked me for my efforts.

For much of the past two years the Ukrainian flag has flown in support for that country against Putin. A year ago the flag became torn and I removed it for repair. In late August the same thing happened again and, having again removed it for repair, I thought it would be an opportune time to fly the St George's Cross. I chose this for the normal patriotic reasons – pride in our country, its royalty, military, way of life, countryside, institutions, etc. Additionally, anyone who is interested in sport would know that at time England were engaged in various sporting activities – the Women's Rugby World Cup (which we eventually won), England cricket versus South Africa, Tour of Britain cycling, and other events not forgetting Tom Pidcock vying for a podium place at the Vuelta. However, the St. George's Cross was only allowed to fly for less than a week before it was unceremoniously removed by certain people in the village who I later believe considered it to be racist and anti-immigrant. Unfortunately, at that time, there was anti-immigrant feeling in various parts of the country where some lobbyists were using both the Union Flag and St George's Cross to protest against immigration and the use of hotels, etc. I can quite understand that if that is your point of view, then the flying of our national flag in Stockcross could be considered to have ulterior motives.

However, that is not my point of view, and I think the use of our national flags in support of these causes is entirely wrong. Europe, Scotland, Ireland and Wales as well as Ukraine and especially the USA all use flags to signal unity and a sign of belonging and shared pride. People will have noticed flags and bunting flying in Newbury town centre all summer long. I personally think it nice to see our national flags flying from churches and Town Halls, etc. It must be remembered that these are national flags, and not political flags.

We should note that our political leaders at their party conferences have all embraced the national flags to show that they support national pride, unity and cohesion, and that they are *against* racism and division. Ed Davey and the Liberal Democrats started the ball rolling with a great show of enthusiasm, followed by Keir Starmer and Labour, and of course the Conservatives as well. In my opinion it is misguided to assume that support of a flag shows support for a particular political party, for example that support of the St George's Cross is an indication of support for the Reform party as has been suggested. In any case these political views are personal views, and we are all different. The fact is that we all live quite closely together in a small village, and we should be able to debate issues quietly and sensibly without being acrimonious with each other.

I do think that there is also a generational divide in that persons of more advanced years do tend to have more traditional outlook and are more likely to support our way of life, our conventions, our institutions and our history than other age groups. I may be wrong but this does seem to be the situation.

As a result of this the Sutton Hall committee is vociferous in not wanting our national flags to be flown at the village hall, in spite of the fact that several villagers have said that it should be up to the "villagers as a whole" to make these decisions, that it is their village, and it should not be up to just a few people on the committee to make such decisions for the wider community.

I will be more than happy to continue my duties as Flag Master if the majority of villagers would like to see flags flying at the Sutton Hall. However, for the time being my flags are folded and put away.

We also agreed flags should not be political in nature or cause bad feelings because we are encouraging harmony and mutual support in our village. The Committee is aware that unfortunately, at the moment, the St George's flag makes some villagers uncomfortable with its associations with anti immigration policies so that flag was recently removed and the Committee will decide which future occasions and celebrations it will be appropriate to fly this and other flags.




